How We Started

Established in 2004 through funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the [Great Lakes Regional Stroke Network](#) ("The Network") grew out of more than twenty-five years of collaboration between public health professionals in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin. The Network aims to increase stroke awareness, prevention and control activities across the Great Lakes region to reduce the burden of stroke.

No single state or program can provide all the adequate resources needed. However, there is power in numbers that can bring about change. Crossing state lines, sharing knowledge, resources and leadership is a step towards reducing the third leading cause of death.

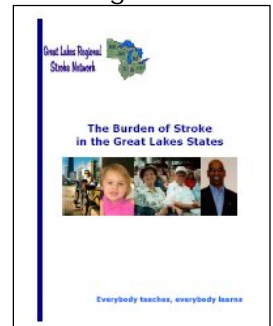
