

Transfer Requirements Guide for Art History – Black Hawk College

Our program introduces undergraduate students to the study of the built environment and the visual arts across time and space: architecture, painting, sculpture, design, and film and media arts. Beyond the chronological and geographical breadth of our fields of study, we are committed to understanding cultures through the lens of the visual. In art history classes, students are introduced to a variety of approaches including stylistic and iconographical analysis, criticism, and historiography. The architecture of Chicago and its suburbs and the many local museums and galleries are a living part of the general curriculum and are specific components in specialized courses. The department serves the entire UIC community, with students from all over campus choosing to take our classes for General Education credit and as electives.

While some of our majors pursue graduate education toward scholarly careers in teaching and museum work, others are attracted to positions with foundations, architectural and art periodicals, or freelance writing. Many students combine their art history background with further study in a wide variety of fields, such as business administration, law, library science, and urban planning. Still others find themselves in related professions such as filmmaking, editorial work, and arts management.

Transfer Admission Guidelines

In all transferrable course work applicants must earn a minimum cumulative grade point average of a 2.75/4.00 (A=4.00) and at least 36 semester hours (54 quarter hours) at time of enrollment. **Admission is competitive. Minimum transfer requirements at time of application/enrollment: University Writing Requirement (English I and II), one Understanding the Creative Arts course, one Understanding the Past course, one Understanding the Individual and Society course, and one Understanding U.S. Society course. A personal statement is required.** Art History majors begin their major classes during the sophomore year. **This guide is based on Black Hawk’s 2008-10 catalog and UIC’s 2011-13 catalog and is valid for students who enroll through Fall 2012.**

Course Substitution Table

UIC general education requirements changed beginning in Fall 2007. Transfer students who enroll at UIC through Spring 2009 will be allowed to follow either the GE pattern used prior to Fall 2007 or the new GE pattern adopted for Fall 2007. Transfer students who enroll at UIC in Fall 2009 or later will be required to follow the GE pattern adopted for Fall 2007.
