UIC general education requirements changed beginning in Fall 2007. Transfer students who enroll at UIC through Spring 2009 will be allowed to follow either the GE pattern used prior to Fall 2007, or the new GE pattern adopted for Fall 2007.

Transfer students who enroll at UIC in Fall 2009 or later will be required to follow the GE pattern adopted for Fall 2007.

TRANSFER ADMISSION GUIDELINES

The UIC College of Business Administration reserves the right to adjust admissions criteria based on space availability. The following guidelines are the minimum requirements needed in order to be considered for admission into the College. Admission is competitive and selection for admission depends on space limitations and the overall applicant pool.

- Minimum grade point average 2.50(A = 4.0) in 24 semester hours at time of application and 36 semester hours at time of enrollment.
- Completion of English Composition I and II (or equivalent), Finite Mathematics and Calculus I (or Business Calculus) are recommended to be completed at time of enrollment.
- Completion of English Composition I (or equivalent) and Calculus I (or Business Calculus) are **highly recommended** at time of application and may be used as a determining factor for admission.
