UIC general education requirements changed beginning in Fall 2007. Transfer students who enroll at UIC through Spring 2009 will be allowed to follow either the GE pattern used prior to Fall 2007, or the new GE pattern adopted for Fall 2007. **Transfer students who enroll at UIC in Fall 2009 or later will be required to follow the GE pattern adopted for Fall 2007.**

**TRANSFER ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS**

- Minimum cumulative grade point average 2.50 (A = 4.0)
- 24 completed semester hours of transferable baccalaureate-oriented course work completed **prior to application**
- 36 completed semester hours by time of enrollment
  - Completion of the **University Writing Requirement** (2 courses in English Composition) by time of enrollment
  - Completion of the **Quantitative Reasoning** requirement (college credit in mathematics, logic, or statistics) by time of enrollment
  - Completion of at least one course in **Analyzing the Natural World** that includes a laboratory by time of enrollment
