TRANSFER ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Minimum cumulative grade point average 2.50 for consideration (A = 4.0)
- Admission is competitive and selection for admission depends on space limitations and the overall applicant pool
- 24 completed semester hours of transferable baccalaureate-oriented course work completed *prior to application*
- 36 completed semester hours by time of enrollment
 - Completion of the **University Writing Requirement** (2 courses in English Composition) by time of enrollment
 - Completion of the **Quantitative Reasoning requirement** (college credit in mathematics, logic, or statistics) by time of enrollment
 - Completion of at least one course in **Analyzing the Natural World** that includes a laboratory by time of enrollment
