There are opportunities to focus on Chemical Dependency Dual Diagnosis Issues as well as case management and individual work with patients. There are opportunities to witness dramatic improvement of the patients level of functioning due to a longer length of stay for a selected group of patients.

Psychiatric Internship: Students in this internship are encourage to develop their own developmental plan with their on site supervisor. This plan includes hours to be worked, population to be worked with, and clinical focus. Students can spend time observing, co-leading, and learning different modalities. These modalities include: Family therapy, individual therapy, milieu work, group therapy, educational groups, and multi-family groups. Students can also go outside of their chosen clinical area to observe other areas. Our facility works with all populations from children to geriatrics. We have the continuum of care from crisis stabilization in-patient units to out-patient therapy. Pathology may differ depending on the area. Students are welcome to join in on any staff inservices, staffings on patients, and other opportunities that may arise. Students must show proof of current professional and general liability before beginning the placement. Community Hospital serving in-patient adults, geriatric patients with symptoms of depression, mania, delusions, hallucinations - these are crisis stabilization units. We also have an adult partial program and out patient chemical dependency program. Student will work with a LCSW performing historys, family sessions, discharge planning and group work.

Description:

Child and Adolescent - Experience in outpatient assessment and treatment of children, adolescents and their families, including phone intake work, clinical assessment, ongoing treatment of individuals and families and possibly group therapy and crisis work. Special training in family therapy is provided. Individual as well as small group supervision. Services are offered in English, Spanish and American Sign Language. Those bilingual in Spanish are strongly encouraged to apply. Adult Outpatient - Provides individual, marital, family and group psychotherapy to outpatient population (without significant history of psychiatric hospitalization), as well as Emergency Services. Students receive an hour of individual supervision and hour of group supervision weekly. Attendance at weekly crisis or group therapy seminars are required according to case assignments. The fieldwork experience will consist of working on and involving one's self in all the areas of treatment on an adult acute inpatient psychiatric unit. This includes but is not limited to: assessment of cases, treatment plan formulation, conducting therapeutic interviews with individuals, families, couples and groups, and discharge planning. The Ravenswood campus has the added potential of extending this work to the adolescent unit. In addition to working with patients from a very diverse population, interns will be involved in the multidisciplinary team. Interns will be considered an active member of this team, which consists of psychiatrists, nurses, other social workers, mental health counselors, and outside collateral people (family members or people from other agencies). Interns will be part of the system coordinating this team to create a unified plan of care for patients. Interns will be involved in both individual and group supervision and other theoretical/practical in-services on the care of patients. Interns will be exposed to and practice with different models of treatment and gain experience applying what they know to practical use. Interns will need proof of a recent TB test and malpractice insurance to work at this agency.

Training placements for students are available in the following programs: Outpatient Program, with adults, children & adolescents, MISA (Mentally ill substance abuse) and MIDD (Mentally ill/developmentally disabled). Case Management Program, where case management with individual and group support is provided to men and women who carry both a psychiatric and substance abuse diagnosis. Employment Program, which provides a range of employment support for clients with varying severity of mental illness. Placement involves the completion of a formal application. The field placements at Alexian Brothers Northwest Mental Health Center are highly competitive and require a formal interview. Application and information material is available from the liaison. All students have administrative responsibilities which include documentation, coordination with other service providers, collaboration and consultation with schools, foster care and child welfare services and with the judiciary and it's ancillary services. Experience with the acute and chronically mentally ill, with child & adolescents, with agencies or services charged with legal care of children & adolescents, and with dually diagnosed clients. Agency is located in the northwest suburbs of Chicago. The main population group is white American born people with increasing numbers of Hispanic, Asian and African American people. There is a growing Asian population in our client base. Students will be exposed to three main theoretical orientations: psychodynamic, cognitive-behavioral, general systems theory. There are scheduled didactic presentations, scheduled rotations to observe all other agency programs, group supervision for child & adolescent services, participation in "linkage case management" ensuring continuation of services once clients are released from State Psychiatric hospitals. All students need their own car, will need to work evenings, will need to furnish a range of drug testing, immunizations and evidence of general physical examinations. Students will be required to have malpractice insurance.

Description:

The Barr-Harris Children's Grief Center was established in 1976 with a three-fold mission: 1) To provide treatment services to any child who has experienced parent loss by death, divorce or abandonment regardless of their ability to pay; 2) To provide information and educational services to other professionals and community groups to help the bereaved child with loss; 3) To conduct research on the bereavement process and mourning in childhood. The Center treats children between the ages of two and 17 who have lost a parent through death, divorce or abandonment, or who have lost a sibling or other close family member through death. The population is culturally and economically diverse. Students will learn how to do a diagnostic evaluation, provide treatment services to a bereave child and the family caretaker, and work in collaboration with other members of the bereaved child's community. In addition to the direct service training opportunities, the students will participate in conducting educational workshops, information presentations to community groups and assist in ongoing treatment outcome research. Through these experiences, the student will learn about the special challenges and techniques of treating bereaved children and their families and how to mobilize the environment on their behalf. The Center's theoretical approach to treatment is psychodynamic. Other services such as parent guidance and school interventions are psychoeducational. The group didactic will feature a developmental perspective and will be designed to help the student learn how this approach applies to a child's response to loss. Different types of loss and their unique effects on the child as well as relevant literature will be included. Students will be responsible for providing individual therapy with bereaved children and other family member/caretakers. Utilize parent guidance with the surviving caretakers and may work collaterally with schools or other organizations involved with the child's welfare. Students may co-lead and present educational workshops and community information meetings.

Description:

The Southside Day Reporting Center is located in the Englewood Community on the south side of Chicago. It is among the few reentry community-based programs for offenders. The Center accepts men/women who are paroled from the IL Dept. of Corrections for intense supervision and treatment. The program's mission is to make communities safe and reduce recidivism. The program combines intensive supervision with comprehensive treatment. Services include assessment, planning, monitoring, reporting, and sanctions; job readiness, and alcohol and drug abuse monitoring. The majority of the clients are male and African American. Treatment occurs in groups primarily and uses a combination of behavioral and psycho-educational modalities. A student would be responsible for providing intense supervision and cognitive intervention for 3-5 client, facilitating a lifeskills group, completing intake assessments, documenting all activities, and participating in team/staff meetings. A student would not make home visits; all interactions with the client would be on site. A background check and drug screen are required prior to placement.

BRASS is one of the oldest chemical dependency treatment and prevention organizations in Illinois. Description:

The Catholic Charities Foster Care Counseling Department provides counseling services for children from birth to adulthood and the foster parents who care for these children. In some instances counseling services are provided to the child and biological parent(s) to assist in family reunification. There is a possibility of providing group counseling services to foster children. The cultural groups most seen as clients are African Americans, Caucasians, and Hispanics. A moderate understanding of these cultural groups is beneficial for working in the Counseling Department. Requirements prior to Beginning Internship: 1. The intern must have his/her car and a valid driver's license. Mileage is reimbursed at the federal rate. 2. The intern must have a physical examination and TB test (required by DCFS). The intern will need to take a DCFS form to the doctor for completion. 3. The intern must be fingerprinted and complete a CANTS check (Child Abuse & Neglect Tracking System). The intern will be asked to go to a specific location to have the finger printing completed. Intern Tasks: Provide counseling services to foster care children, families (foster and/or biological) and possibly groups and carry a caseload of eight (8) clients, with a combination of office and home based cases. 24 hours/week for a full nine month period (mid September to mid May); intern must work a flex schedule to accommodate evening clients; Counseling Dept staff meetings twice a month. Individual supervision one-two hours/week by an LCSW and intern group supervision provided twice/month by an LCSW. Agency is a large social welfare agency that serves poor and needy clients. Program serves urban youth, who are wards of the state, have mental health problems and are in foster care.

The student must have valid driver's license, a physical examination with TB test and must be fingerprinted to complete a CANTS check.

Chicago Health Circle is a program within Chicago Health Outreach, whose parent organization is the Heartland Alliance for Human Rights and Human Needs. The mission of Chicago Health Outreach (CHO) is to provide holistic health services to disenfranchised persons. CHO serves homeless persons or persons who reside in under served areas and typically are denied access to health services. CHOP believe that it is the unalienable right of clients to receive services no matter what their race, creed, or economic status. Chicago Health Circle provides long term case management services to persons with a chronic mental illness and a history of homelessness. The purpose of the program is to prevent reoccurring hospitalizations and help clients develop independent living skills. Toward this end we utilize a team of social workers who provide assertive community treatment into the communities where our clients live. The program has a psychiatrist, a nurse, a substance abuse specialist, a psycho-social day program and subsidized housing that augment our case management programs.

Description:

The main activities of the Chicago Women's Health Center (CWHC) are: direct client services, including counseling, health care, and outreach. All services are provided from a woman-centered perspective. Services are provided regardless of a woman's ability to pay. CWHC is a diverse collective of women and is affirmative of women of color and lesbian and bisexual women. Counseling is from a feminist/woman centered perspective, using other modalities as appropriate. Approach is insight oriented and supportive, and includes attention to clients' concrete needs and the impact of various forms of oppression. Training is provided through weekly supervision sessions, including verbal discussions, assigned reading, process recordings, audio-taping and review of case notes. Group consultation is open to all CWHC social workers once a month. Training on women's health issues is provided. Students will be responsible for a caseload of 8-12 individual clients, one group, public advocacy and intervention.. Participation in counseling staff meetings and additional administrative duties related to the counseling program as needed. One evening per week is strongly suggested, monthly counseling meetings are required, and bimonthly Sunday collective meetings are encouraged. CWHC is accessible by public transportation (Red line, Clark street bus, Halsted bus). Previous counseling or social service experience required.

Thirty-three WilPower members live in permanent, supervised housing in Glencoe, Morton Grove, Skokie, and Wilmette. More than 32 percent are gainfully employed, many for several years with the same employer. We have a pragmatic belief in the potential of WilPower members – a potential to chart a direction to recovery; to develop new skills and achieve goals; to solve problems in real-world environment; and to contribute to their communities. We encourage the [participation of families. WilPower's psychiatric rehabilitation services are available to people living in the north and northwest suburbs. We complement traditional mental health centers, which provide medication-model treatments. And, as a solution to the mental health care needs of the communities we serve, WilPower is more cost-effective and results-oriented than other alternatives, such as in-patient care.

Description:

In this internship setting student will have an opportunity to see individuals, couples and occasional family groups. When appropriate student will carry a small case load of clients from initial intake through case closing. Student will also be in contact with company reps and supervisors on a consultation basis (supervisory referrals). Student will become proficient in public speaking. Student will perform administrative responsibilities including EAP account management functions such as the scheduling and administration of supervisory trainings and employee orientations. Student will also develop and present a wellness topic for a client company group. Student will become familiar with the computerized clinical assessment tool and be responsible for data entry, as appropriate. Student will be exposed to a variety of service areas including: assessment and referral or short term counseling for mental illness and chemical dependency, child and family issues and referral for financial and legal issues. Student will be responsible for ongoing resource development for such referrals. The population served is very diverse in all areas including: SES, race gender, ethnicity, sexual orientation and age. Clients served in face to face assessments come from the greater Chicagoland area (city and suburbs). Students will be exposed to a variety of theoretical orientations including: crisis intervention, brief treatment models and solution focused, cognitive-behavioral therapies. Student will have weekly individual supervision and will attend group supervision, staff meetings and scheduled staff in-service and seminars. Student should have a car to be able to do site visits to conduct training's and orientations.

Description:

Horizons Clinic is the mental health clinic of World Relief Chicago, a non-for-profit agency set up to assist with the resettlement needs of refugees. The clients at Horizons Clinic have all been victims of war and violence, often encountering concentration camps, intense physical and psychological torture, the execution of family members (often directly witnessed), and now separation from both their home country and their remaining family. Our client population represents over 15 countries speaking over 10 languages. The staff includes three direct service workers and an office manager who are refugees from Bosnia and Kosovo. It also includes a Clinical Psychologist as our Director, a Psychiatrist, and two MSW Clinical Social Workers. Horizons Clinic offers a variety of clinical and case management services across our Adult & Child & Adolescent Programs. These services include psychological & medication screening & evaluations, psychosocial assessments, psychiatric disability assessments, individual & group Psychotherapy and counseling, case management services, school mediation, & parent education. The modalities for these services include individual, couple, group, and family therapy- all on an outpatient basis. Our Child & Adolescent Program also offer a psychosocial education component within our After-School and Summer School sub-program.
